### Preparing your presentation

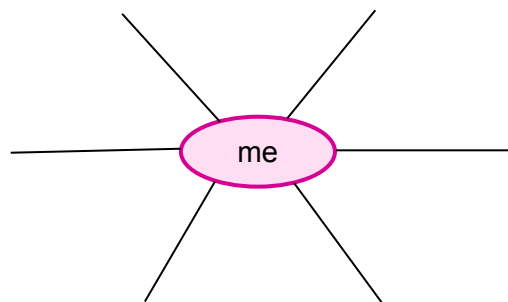
- Your presentation should be between three and five minutes long.
- You should introduce the track that you've inherited first, play it, then introduce the track you would like to pass on and play it.
- You should think particularly carefully about a strong ending. Do not finish with, 'That's it'.
- You should not read off notes.
- Think about your body language (look confident, no fidgeting) and tone of voice as well as just what you say.
- Make sure that you practise your talk, ideally in front of an audience (family, friends or at least a mirror).

### Giving your presentation

- Make appropriate, controlled, effective use of standard English vocabulary and grammar.
- Communicate clearly and confidently.
- Bring in your inheritance tracks, books, films or pictures. If you have chosen films, you should select an appropriate short clip (two or three minutes) from each one. If you have chosen places you could bring in a photograph or brochure.
